



Cabrera taught himself the blues harp by playing along to the radio and formed his

first band by 1968. But he didn't abandon his Latin roots. "The first time I blew a harp

over Latin music was over (Eddie) Palmieri's "Azucar," he recalls. "It's the same music.

The same slaves that landed in Cuba landed here too. So when it comes down to

blowing a blues, I can do it over a chan-chan just as easily.

FELIX CABRERA

was born in La Habana, Cuba. He came to the U.S. at a very young age and quickly got hooked on rock, blues, R&B and soul music. He played with various bands and in 1974, formed the A Train Blues Band with Arthur Neilson. The band backed up and recorded with Victoria Spivey and North Carolina bluesman Tarheel Slim. Felix also discovered the music of Paul Butterfield and Little Walter.

In the next few years, Felix experimented with the diatonic harmonica in Cuban music and co-led The Internationals, opening shows for Big Joe Turner and James Cotton. In 1983, he formed Felix and the Havanas, recording "NEXT!!" and opening for James Brown at the Lone Star Café in NYC. The band also opened many times for Buddy Guy & Junior Wells, Bobby Blue Bland, Jr. Walker, Wilson Pickett, Dr. John, Lonnie Mack, Marcia Ball

and many others. Felix was the inaugural act at NYC's Manny's Car Wash blues club and he performed on the NPR program, Blues Stage, hosted by Ruth Brown.

In the early 90's, Felix's first album, NEXT!, was released in Europe. In the late 90's, Felix joined Jimmy Vivino and the Black Italians. Vivino and bandmates backed Felix on his second CD, "Cubops Cublues". That was followed up by "Pressure Cooker", "For Green" and "Felix Cabrera and Jimmy Vivino - Live At The Turning Point". All were highly rated in Downbeat Magazine.

Over the last 15 years, Felix has performed numerous times with Vivino, backed up Marty Balin and has fronted The Ed Palermo Big Band in a program of Paul Butterfield and Mike Bloomfield music. Felix most recently appeared with Palermo in August of 2015 at the Big Apple Blues & Barbecue Festival in NYC for a crowd of over 6000. In 2008, The Black Italians reunited and in

2012 they recorded "Jimmy Vivino and the Black Italians – 13 Live" at Levon Helm's Ramble in Woodstock, NY featuring Felix on several tracks. They also performed on the Conan TV show and headlined the 2014 King Biscuit Blues Festival in Helena, Arkansas.

Felix also fronts the Felix Cabrera Band which has performed at such venues as B.B. Kings, The Towne Crier Café and The Turning Point. The band features Felix along with Arthur Neilson (guitars), Tim Regusis (keyboards), Phil Butler (bass), Bill Schroeder (drums) and with occasional guitarists Jimmy Bennett and Matt Mirabile.

With the induction of the Paul Butterfield Blues Band into the Rock & Roll Hall of Fame, there is a new appreciation by audiences to Felix's approach to blues and rock harp.
